
Dr. J. Thaddeus Morgan

Growing up poor himself, J. Thaddeus Morgan knows many needy children and adults don't have access to dental care — and he wants to change that. "I understand the other side of the coin, because I was there."

The 42-year-old Lake Mary dentist has been involved in many efforts to expand dental care to Central Floridians in need, including the Health Care Center for the Homeless Inc.'s expansion of its Orange Blossom Family Health Center in downtown Orlando. He also worked to establish a new program, which began in September, in which University of Florida dental students provide treatment at the center's clinic.

Morgan — one of three winners in the Orlando Business Journal's 2009 Health Care Heroes Community Outreach category — also co-founded and volunteers at the Dental Care Access Foundation Inc., which provides dental care for low-income Central Floridians.

Morgan is vice chairman of the Florida Board of Dentistry and is working on legislation that could expand the reach of preventive dental care to more than 100,000 children statewide.
